#### **DATCP AmeriCorps Grant Manager- Farm to School Program (LTE)**

This grant-funded position will serve as the AmeriCorps Farm to School Grant Manager responsible for program development, coordination, implementation and overall management of the AmeriCorps Farm to School program. This includes building partnerships with partner site staff and leading the placement of at least thirty AmeriCorps Members in a minimum of sixteen partner sites in the State of Wisconsin. The federal and state AmeriCorps programs require extensive reporting and compliance monitoring and this position will be responsible for these functions. This position will also be responsible for the development of program structure and guidelines; directing service/training; and grant management, including handling the budget and compliance requirements of the project.
