



STAGE I: STATEMENT OF SCOPE

- Scope preparation began 5/2022
- Governor approval: I/26/23; expires 7/30/25
- Public hearings:
 - In person: 3/29, 3/30, 4/3
 - Online: through 4/18
- DATCP Board approval: 5/11

Stage 1: Statement of Scope

- Preparation of scope by agency staff.
- DOA review.
- Gubernatorial approval.
- Publication in Administrative Register.
- Preliminary hearing, if held.
- Approval by agency head.

Time in Stage: 1 month

Total Time in Rulemaking Process: 1 month



STAGE 2: INITIAL DRAFTING

This is where you come in – ATCP 72 Rule Revision Advisory Committee.

Stage 2: Initial Drafting

- Initial drafting of rule by agency staff.
- Preparation of Economic Impact Analysis, including solicitation of public comment.

Time in Stage: 1 to 4 months

Total Time: 2 to 5 months



STAGE 3: EXTERNAL REVIEWS

- DATCP Board approves hearing draft, economic impact analysis.
- Submit fiscal estimate and economic impact analysis.
- Legislative Council Clearing House review.
- Public comment period for drafted language.

Stage 3: External Reviews

- Review by Legislative Council Staff.
- Agency public hearing and public comment period.

Time in Stage: 1 to 2 months

Total Time: 3 to 7 months



STAGE 4: FINAL AGENCY REVIEW

- Accept or reject each comment from Legislative and public review.
- DATCP Board approval of final draft.
- Submit final rule package:
 - Clearinghouse report
 - Plain language analysis
 - Fiscal estimate
 - Summary of public comments
 - Explanation of modifications made from comments

Stage 4: Final Agency Review

- Agency responds to Legislative Council review and public comment.
- Rule revisions and final drafting.
- Gubernatorial approval.

Time in Stage: 2 weeks to 1 month

Total Time: 3.5 to 8 months

STAGE 5: LEGISLATIVE REVIEW

 Respond to standing committee and Joint Committee for Review of Admin. Rules (JCRAR) review.

Stage 5: Legislative Review

- Referral to standing committee by legislative leadership.
- 30-day standing committee passive review.
- 30-day JCRAR passive review.
- Opportunities for legislative objection.

Time in Stage: 3 months

Total Time: 6.5 to 11 months



STAGE 6: PUBLICATION

Submitted to Legislative Reference Bureau for formatting and publication.

Stage 6: Publication

- Agency submits rule to LRB.
- Formatting and publication by LRB in Administrative Register.
- Rule takes effect on day after publication.

SCOPE STATEMENT SS 010-23

- Governor approval: 1/26/23; expires 7/30/25
- Public hearings:
 - In person: 3/29, 3/30, 4/3
 - Online: through 4/18
- Does not include bed and breakfast establishments covered in ATCP 73.



a) Consider expanding definitions of terms used in Wis. Admin. Code ch. ATCP 72 to provide clarity, removing definitions not used, and adding new definitions.

- Currently 21 definitions.
- Expanded to 85+ during draft writing.
 - Tourist or transient
 - Lodging facility
 - Individually-keyed unit
 - Rental group
 - Sleeping area and sleeping room
 - Good repair

- b) Consider further clarification of the differences between a tourist rooming house and a hotel or motel.
- Five or more rooms is a hotel/motel.
- Four or less rooms is a tourist rooming house.

c) Consider adding additional licensing categories and modifying requirements for specialty lodging where basic amenities are not typically provided and special considerations for temporary special event lodging opportunities.

- Primitive cabins less than 400 square feet in area are licensed under ATCP 79 campgrounds.
- Primitive cabins larger than 400 square feet in area –
 specialty lodging?
- Special event lodging similar to special event campground.

d) Consider an alternate inspection frequency for tourist rooming houses.

- 9,045 licensed tourist rooming houses
- 1,809 licensed hotels/motels

e) Consider including a testing frequency for safe potable water at facilities served by a private well.

- Public systems are tested annually for total coliform and *E. coli*, at a minimum.
- Current code does not specify a testing frequency.

f) Consider adding nitrate testing as part of the annual water sampling for private wells.

- Public systems are tested annually, at a minimum.
- Current code does not require nitrate testing.
- Per DHS, high nitrate (>10 mg/l):
 - May increase the risk of thyroid disease and may increase the risk of colon cancer.
 - Can cause blue baby syndrome. A condition that affects how the blood carries oxygen.
 - Can increase the risk of birth defects.


- g) Consider removing outdated carbon monoxide alarm installation, and maintenance requirements, and update to reflect current standards as set forth in Wis. Stat. § 101.149.
- IBC changed focus from putting alarms near the fuelburning appliances to putting alarms near the sleeping rooms.
- Wis. Stat. adopted changes in 2017 Wisconsin Act 330.

- h) Consider removing outdated smoke alarm installation, and maintenance requirements, and update to reflect current standards as set forth in Wis. Stat. § 101.145.
- Currently code only requires a single smoke alarm in tourist rooming houses.
- Each level, outside each sleeping area, and within each sleeping room.

i) Consider determining department responsibility with respect to the department of safety and professional services in regards to building construction and fire detection, protection, and suppression.

Remove specific references to SPS codes.

j) Consider addressing department-specific language for health and safety features related to slip, trip, and fall hazards commonly found in hotels, motels, and tourist rooming houses.



- k) Consider modeling International Building
 Code standards or other state regulations impacting
 hotels, motels, and tourist rooming houses, to provide
 greater clarity on non-gender specific toilet rooms.
- Toilets per person rather than toilets per gender.
- Businesses can choose to designate.

- I) Consider addressing emerging communicable diseases and other threats to safety. The department will consider including appropriate definitions and provisions to support lodging facilities in addressing emerging pathogens and other new threats.
- Water management programs for facilities with a confirmed Legionella.
 - II Legionella outbreak investigations since 2018.
- Vomit, diarrhea, blood clean-up procedures.

m) Consider addressing pests of public health significance, such as bed bugs. Consider including action steps and enforcement procedures to be followed when pests are found.

- MN regs
- Expand beyond insects and rodents.

n) Consider addressing an alternative licensing fee schedule based on the program risks, facilities, and activities that more fairly aligns the lodging complexity with the appropriate licensing fee.



o) Consider adjusting fees to incorporate the additional costs of the department to perform inspections, licensing, and investigations.

p) Consider adding requirements for reporting illnesses, injuries, and accidents that require an emergency medical service response. This data will assist in designing effective outreach and meaningful interventions, and the data collected may help support future rule development.

- Death, Illnesses, Injuries (DII) form used for public swimming pools.
- Situations requiring EMS response due to death, illnesses, and injuries from the building environment.
- Not EMS response due to "person vs. person" or "person vs. self" conflicts.

- q) Consider incorporating criticality methodology throughout the rule. This risk-based methodology seeks to identify those provisions that are more critical for protecting public health and to designate the risk level of hazards. This method provides clarity to industry by identifying those provisions which are more likely to cause illness or injury, and supports a risk-based inspection approach.
- FDA classification that has been adopted in ATCP 75,
 76, 78.
- Priority items to prevent or limit deaths, illnesses, or injuries.
- Priority foundation items that support, facilitate, or enable one or more priority items.
- Core general sanitation and maintenance of facilities and equipment.
