Wisconsin Farm to School Overview

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) Farm to School and Institution program, Wisconsin Farm to School Advisory Council, and stakeholders collaborate to expand access to locally produced foods in schools and education institutions. Partners work to strengthen regional food system resilience, support community-based initiatives, expand statewide partnerships, strengthen food supply chain connections, and expand equitable access to Wisconsin-sourced foods.

Wisconsin farm to school network partners support the connections along the supply chain and expand access to nutrition and agricultural education, school garden developments, engagement activities, and Wisconsin-sourced foods.

DATCP Farm to School Program

DATCP provides services through a Farm to School and Institution Specialist. DATCP activities focus on procurement and economic development assistance for farmers by supporting and facilitating connections along local food supply chains from producer to processor, to buyer, and ultimately to children's plates. Working with farmers, food distributors, and processors, DATCP supports farm to school activities by identifying and reducing impediments to increasing the amount of Wisconsin-grown and produced foods served in Wisconsin schools.

Marketplace Meetings

Marketplace Meetings are a collaborative effort between DATCP and the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI). These meetings provide a venue for school nutrition professionals and Wisconsin food producers to make connections and ask questions about procuring and selling local foods. Marketplace Meetings take place monthly during the school year and involve up to 50 guests.

School Nutrition Association of Wisconsin Trade Show



DATCP and DPI sponsored booths and established a Wisconsin local food section at the School Nutrition Association of Wisconsin (SNA) 2024 Conference trade show. Over 250 school food directors and culinary staff had the opportunity to sample Wisconsin food, and local food vendors provided education to attendees on their products, ordering, and procurement. U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Specialty Crop Block Grant funding allowed Wisconsin farm to school vendors to attend the show, build awareness, and increase networks to Wisconsin school nutrition professional attendees.

Wisconsin Farm to School Grant Program

With one-time funding from a USDA Food and Nutrition Service (USDA-FNS) Patrick Leahy Farm to School Grant, DATCP piloted the Wisconsin Farm to School Grant Program. The USDA-FNS Patrick Leahy Farm to School Grant Program has the objective of improving access to local foods in eligible schools through comprehensive farm to school programming that includes local procurement and agricultural education efforts. The goal of the Wisconsin Farm to School Grant Program is to enable communities to develop farm to school partnerships, implement farm to school initiatives, and strengthen Wisconsin's statewide farm to school network.

In FY 2024, DATCP awarded \$250,000 through a competitive application process to eight projects, with individual awards ranging from \$10,000 to \$40,000. The projects have engaged more than 35 Wisconsin farm businesses, 55 schools and early childcare education sites, 200 community members and local partners, and 2,500 students.

The project aims to maintain and expand statewide farm to early care coordination to increase equitable access to the benefits of farm to school by supporting the piloting and expansion of farm to ECE community teams in ECE sites across Milwaukee and the Tribal Nations.

Madison Youth Black Excellence Life Readiness Cooking Class & Meal Kit Program, Pasture and Plenty (Mad Local Food Group, LLC)



Through two, four-week, afterschool classes, the Youth Black Excellence Life Readiness Cooking Class & Meal Kit Program (Youth BE Program) is providing meal kits containing locally sourced ingredients that highlight Wisconsin's harvest seasons, allowing students to explore, connect, learn, and create food culture. Each week, participants join a virtual class led by diverse instructors in the Madison food community. Classes include a kitchen science lesson and virtual field trip that introduces students to places and careers in local food systems.

Nourish Farms, Inc.

The Expanding Farm to School Learning in Sheboygan County project is increasing food literacy for 600 additional students in three public school districts: Sheboygan Falls, Sheboygan, and Plymouth. Grant funds are helping grow capacity at Nourish Farms, Inc. to host additional field trips and deliver lessons to 22 more classes; increase equitable access to field trips and

programs for three area lowincome schools; repair garden infrastructure at partner schools; and deepen school stakeholder engagement.

Wisconsin Food Hub Cooperative

Building Farm to School and ECE Networks and Procurement Systems in Waupaca County is building a collaborative network of farm to school and early childhood programs on a local level. DATCP Farm to School Advisory Council

<u>2009 Wisconsin Act 293</u> was created to promote the use of locally grown food in school meals and snacks, grant rulemaking authority, and create the Farm to School Council.

DATCP Farm to School Advisory Council members are nominated by peers or themselves and appointed by the DATCP Secretary for up to two three-year terms. Council membership includes staff from DATCP, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS), and the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI), as well as agriculture supply chain leaders, child health and nutrition professionals, school food service authorities, educators, and community leaders. The Council makes recommendations to guide the development of farm to school in Wisconsin and create the Wisconsin Farm to School Annual Report.

2024 Farm to School Council Recommendations

FUND THE WISCONSIN FARM TO SCHOOL GRANT PROGRAM

The Wisconsin Farm to School Grant Program was created by 2009 Wisconsin Act 293. With approved funding, DATCP will distribute grant funds to schools and institutions to increase local food purchasing.

SUPPORT EQUITABLE AND INCLUSIVE ACCESS

Support access for all students so all children have access to local foods and/or agricultural and nutrition education.

INVEST IN LOCAL FOOD SYSTEMS

Continue local supply chain development and infrastructure for schools, including food purchases sourced from Wisconsin farmers, processors, and local businesses.

ENGAGE WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES

Advance the relevance of culinary positions through competitive pay and benefits.

ADVANCE CULTURALLY RELEVANT MENU OFFERINGS

Support comprehensive training for culturally relevant food options across districts statewide, ensuring involvement at every stage of the supply chain—from local producers to frontline staff in schools.
