










Our Mission

Soil & Water Resource Management Program

This grant from the Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection provides funds to carry out soil and water conservation activities that include providing cost share assistance to landowners to install best management practices throughout Wood County. The goal is to reduce sediment and nutrient runoff and to improve water quality in the lakes, streams, and drinking water of Wood County. With an approved Land and Water Resource Management Plan the LWCD receives grant funds to hire staff to implement the LWRM plan. SWRM funds are available to pay for salaries, support costs, and to provide cost sharing to landowners. This is a continuing grant. This program provides funding to the equivalent of 2.25 FTE positions to support carrying out our soil and water protection. This is a state mandated program.
